Border Measures

AIPP (changing employer)

- According to Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), if an applicant currently has an AIPP permanent residence application in processing and changes employers, they must do the following:
 1. inform the province
 2. obtain a modified endorsement certificate
 3. request a letter of support from the province
 4. also, request that the province amend the original endorsement to reflect the new employer and the effective date of the change of employer
 5. ask the province to issue a new letter of support for a new work permit
 6. inform IRCC through the web form, and upload the modified endorsement certificate and the new letter of support from the province through the web form
 7. apply for a new work permit with a designated AIPP employer (if applicable)

- According to Canada.ca, the new NOC 2021 includes changes such as the addition, aggregation/merging, and splitting of unit groups. It also recognizes certain groups across broad categories.

Changes to NOC

- Overhauls the current four-category NOC “Skill level” structure. It introduces a new six-category system representing the level of Training, Education, Experience and Responsibilities (TEER) required for entry into an occupation.

Changes to NOC

- Adopts a five-tiered hierarchical arrangement of occupational groups with successive levels of disaggregation containing broad occupational categories, major groups, sub-major groups, minor groups, and unit groups.

Example of coding in NOC 2021 Version 1.0: Judges, lawyers and Quebec notaries
